## Eligibility:

- Must have a disability that creates a substantial barrier to employment.
- Must receive or be eligible for TANF benefits—or be a youth (ages 14-24) in the household.

TANF eligibility includes having at least one dependent child under 18 or, for ages 18-19, enrollment in secondary education.

- Must attend services in person in Bladen, Cumberland, Harnett, Hoke, Lee, Moore, or Robeson counties.
- Must be eligible to work in the United States.
- Household income must meet the state's federal poverty level percentage.
